Discussion and potential action on proposed changes to water efficiency standards
 The meeting began with Mary Ann Dickinson of the Alliance for Water Efficiency and
 Peter Mayer with Water Demand Management gave an overview of the proposed
 changes.

Several key points were made:

- Current standards were enacted by the passage of the Energy Policy Act of 1992. In 2006, the Water Sense program was created and has become the unofficial standard for many products.
- Current proposed changes would change several key definitions and how the standards are enforced. These changes would also create a new product class without any efficiency standards.
- Several states have their own efficiency standards (Texas included), however it's unclear if those standards will remain intact should these rule changes pass.
- These products consume both water and energy, changes to efficiency standards could be costly in multiple ways.
- Efficiency standards for clothes washers have provided the greatest water savings among all water-related fixtures (toilets, sinks, etc.)
- Having consistent water efficiency standards provides a level playing-field for manufacturers. Creating a product class without water efficiency standards not only creates a problem from a water conservation standpoint, but also from a manufacturing standpoint as products without efficiency standards and oversight could provide substantial competition.
- Should these standards pass, litigation is expected. However, the outcome is unclear.

K. Guz then asked for comments from council membership regarding action related to this development.

Bill Hoffman stated his view is the WCAC should sign AWE's letter to the DOE.

C.J. Tredway stated she was uncomfortable with the WCAC signing or sending a letter commenting on the proposed changes as a group.

Craig Elam, Aubrey Spear, and Greg Carter share C.J. Tredway's sentiment.

Kevin Kluge noted that TWDB is currently considering making comments. A document was created for internal discussion and shared with the WCAC regarding the potential impacts the proposed changes could have on state water supply planning.

Jennifer Walker stated she is glad that TWDB is looking into this. While she would like the WCAC to consider signing on to AWE's letter, it may not be necessary as member's individual organizations may be taking their own action.

K. Guz made a motion for the Council to make a formal recommendation that TWDB continue analysis on impacts the proposed rule changes would have on state water planning.

B. Hoffman seconded the motion and noted it should be mentioned the potential impacts these changes could have regarding the state's water resources.

A vote resulted in 16 affirmative votes, with 6 members abstaining from voting (Jennifer Allis – TCEQ, David Villarreal – TDA, John Foster – TSSWCB, Kevin Kluge – TWDB, Maria Martinez – Federal Agencies, and Valerie Miller – River Authorities) and 1 member absent. The motion passed.
